## Plans complete for Stodden Park improvements

Design work is complete and construction should begin this fall on \$2.5 million worth of improvements at Stodden Park that will complement a new aquatic facility and carousel under construction at the park.

The project is being funded by a \$2.5 million donation from the Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation and Montana Resources is designed to flow through and tie existing and new park features together and add many new amenities.

In a presentation last week before Butte-Silver Bow commissioners, Parks and Recreation Director J.P. Gallagher and representatives of lead design firm on the project, Water and Environmental Technologies (WET), and Steiner Thuesen, landscape architects, gave an overview of the final plans, which include constructing a central midway and commons area, rehabilitating the existing tennis courts and adding a new destination playground. Plans will also create an additional 100 parking spaces, add more sidewalks and many more trees and improve the park's storm water collection system. Gallagher said the county has been engaged with the designers for 7 or 8 months on the plan, including biweekly design meetings with various stakeholder groups. He said the level of collaboration has been wonderful, with many volunteers attending every meeting.

The midway commons area will provide a walkway between the carousel and the new waterpark and will extend to the tennis courts. The midway will include raised planters, ornamental trees and benches, as well as a central pavilion, with bathrooms, that will play off the Columbia Gardens theme and can be used for picnics. Another "Columbia Gardens" feature of the midway courtyard will be a harp design created in paving stones.

An "ice-skating ribbon," constructed of pavers, will be built behind the carousel building. Curbing around the winding loop will control drainage into the storm water system. The ribbon can be used for walking in summer months and can be flooded for ice-skating in the winter.

The three tennis courts that have been sinking will be dug up and the ground will be stabilized so that they can be rebuilt. The other three courts will be resurfaced as well. Plans call for adding new lines on the courts and hoops so they can also be used for basketball. Other additions will be a spectator area with bleacher and a water fountain near the courts.

There will be two new playground areas, one for ages 2-5 and a larger one designed for 5 to 12-year-olds. Features of the playground for older children include a timbered "mine-tunnel" entranceway, a 40-foot headframe with a zip-line, a 22-foot-high "Big M" hill and ore-car trash receptacles. Plans include an adult exercise area near the smaller playground.

The park's entrance on Utah Ave. will be

spruced up with a new archway, designed by Butte architect Harold Godtland, and a roundabout to control traffic between the two parking lots. Engineers from WET and Butte-Silver Bow are in discussion with the Montana Department of Transportation about adding a second entrance to the park off Rowe Road.

Gallagher said the county hopes to have the complete bid package ready to put out Sept. 10. Bids should be awarded in mid-October and construction should begin later that month. The improvement work at the park should be completed by fall 2018.

## AWARE looking for new owner for KANA 580 AM

As of August 15, KANA 580 AM is looking for a new owner. The decision comes after the radio station became victim of arson in July. The station has been off air ever since.

Director of Community Relations Pat Noonan says AWARE, the current KANA owner, is hoping a local person or entity will take over the radio station.

"KANA is a historical, valuable community resource to Anaconda that's been around since the mid 1940s," he said.

For someone interested in taking over KANA, much of the infrastructure is still intact after the arson. Smoke and fire damage has affected the building and broadcast equipment.

However, Noonan says the transmission equipment is working, and the FCC licensing is current. Good news is that this condition makes it easy for KANA to be moved and/or transferred elsewhere.

The decision to offer up KANA was hard, but necessary to ensure AWARE continues with its highest mission of helping adults, children and their

families live independent lives.

"Both fire damage and significant state budget cuts in human services this year has made reinvestment by AWARE nearly impossible," Noonan said.

AWARE acquired KANA from Butte Broadcasting in 2012. Since that time, AWARE has worked to provide Anaconda and Southwest Montana with a community-focused radio broadcast. KANA also offered career opportunities for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

During the last few years, KANA has won several awards presented by the Montana Broadcasters Association. Honors include awards in local public service, Anaconda Copperhead athletics coverage and outstanding play-by-play broadcasting.

"For all those involved with KANA, we would like to thank you for your support in building a community-proud radio station," Noonan said.

That is why it was so silly that ESPN decided it had to remove a broadcaster named Robert Lee from calling the Sept. 2 William & Mary-Virginia football game because of his name. The broadcaster Robert Lee, who is not related to General Robert E. Lee, instead will call the Youngstown State-Pittsburgh game that day.

ESPN's Lee, who is of Asian descent, is nothing like the Southern general from the Civil War. To my knowledge, ESPN's Robert Lee never owned a

ESPN says it did not make the call because the company feared broadcaster Robert Lee's presence in the TV booth would offend anyone, though there is some people out there willing to be offended by anything. Instead, the company worried the broadcaster might become the focus of “social hectoring and trolling.”

## FWP monitoring recent fish deaths in Yellowstone River

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks is closely monitoring recent discoveries of dead fish along the upper Yellowstone River.

Monitoring floats on the Yellowstone River in the Paradise Valley on Thursday turned up 19 more dead mountain whitefish.

Additionally, Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks’ crews discovered 1 moribund fish, which are live fish close to death. Moribund fish are important for histology testing to determine the cause of mortality.

Thursday’s monitoring floats follow similar efforts Monday and Tuesday on the Yellowstone between Livingston and Springdale. These floats turned up 76 dead whitefish, two dead suckers and one dead brown trout.

Official test results won’t be available until next week at the earliest and biologists don’t have enough information yet to determine the cause of these localized and limited fish kills.

“We’re still collecting information at this point,” said Travis Horton, Region 3 fisheries manager. “We aren’t currently considering any closures or restrictions. However, we ask that anglers not target mountain whitefish.”

Thursday’s monitoring float focused on the stretch of Yellowstone from Grey Owl Fishing Access Site to Pine Creek. This stretch was hardest hit last summer by proliferative kidney disease, or PKD. In 2016, upwards of 1,900 dead mountain whitefish were found on one bank of the river.

MFWP biologists doubled their monitoring efforts Friday, using two boats to look for dead or dying fish between Livingston and Springdale. The results were encouraging. Two boats, one floating each side of the

river, collected 48 dead mountain whitefish, one moribund whitefish and one moribund longnose sucker. A moribund fish is a live fish close to death and critical for histology testing to determine the cause of mortality.

On Tuesday, along the same stretch of river, biologists used one boat and counted 52 dead whitefish. “Though we still don’t know if the cause of death is disease related, it seems clear that we’re not seeing the same magnitude of fish kill we had last year,” said Travis Horton, FWP Region 3 fisheries manager. “We’re not considering any closures or restriction, but are asking that anglers not target whitefish for the time being.”

Last summer a proliferative kidney disease, or PKD, outbreak on the upper Yellowstone River led to an emergency closure by FWP and the death of thousands of mountain whitefish, which are native to the river.

During daily monitoring floats this past week, FWP biologists have found less than 150 dead whitefish.

PKD is caused by a microscopic parasite that exists in the river year-round. Though the reason the parasite will suddenly cause PKD is unknown, high water temperatures, low flows and general fish stress can be factors.

Conditions this year are much different – water temperatures have remained cooler and flows are above average. In addition, the time of year is later with longer, cooler nights. These environmental differences could result in a much different scenario and outcome compared to last year’s fish kill.



A \$2.5 million grant from the Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation and Montana Resources will pay for the central improvements to the park.

Next summer, it will be exciting to see the opening of the new waterpark. After years without a public pool, Butte will be able to boast a new, state-of-the-art facility that kids of all ages—and a large number of adults—will enjoy. Likewise, we're looking forward to the opening of the long-awaited Spirit of Columbia Gardens Carousel. So many of us who enjoyed the carousel at the Gardens are looking forward to reliving our memories of happy times there and watching a new generation ride the painted ponies.

With the addition of an attractive central courtyard with benches, a picnic pavilion and planters; two new playgrounds for the kids; new picnic tables and shelters and renovated tennis and basketball courts, the park will really shine. Adding more parking spaces and sidewalks and a possible second



entrance for the park will make it more convenient so that even more people will be able to enjoy the park.

## *Of Narcissism, Nazism, and Christianity*

A nuclear-armed, mentally unstable POTUS. A self-confessed White Supremacist, whose father marched with the Ku Klux Klan. A pathological liar who equates actions of unarmed protesters carrying "Stop the Hate" signs with torch-bearing, armed, helmeted young men carrying Confederate and Nazi flags, and shields. When a self-proclaimed admirer of Hitler weaponized his car to kill and maim, copying ISIS in Europe, this terrorist act was ignored by our nation's political "moral authority."

The mental disease threatening our society from our POTUS is narcissism. The Mayo Clinic staff have posted the criteria for narcissistic personality disorder on their site, no doubt in response to widespread concern about the resurgence of Nazism and nuclear holocaust. These features are listed:

Having an exaggerated sense of self-importance

Expecting to be recognized as superior even without achievements that warrant it

Exaggerating your achievements and talents

Being preoccupied with fantasies about success, power, brilliance, beauty or the perfect mate

Believing that you are superior

and can only be understood by or associate with equally special people

Requiring constant admiration

Having a sense of entitlement

Expecting special favors and unquestioning compliance with your expectations

Taking advantage of others to get what you want

Having an inability or unwillingness to recognize the needs and feelings of others

Being envious of others and believing others envy you

Behaving in an arrogant or haughty manner

Immediately following the terrorism in Charlottesville, this statement was issued: "The scenes at the right-wing extremist march were absolutely repulsive - naked racism, antisemitism and hate in their most evil form were on display." These words were Angela Merkel's.

A spokesman for Merkel added:

"Such images and chants are disgusting wherever they may be and they are diametrically opposed to the political goals of the Chancellor and the entire German government." In addition, Chancellor Merkel supported "those who peacefully oppose such aggressive, far-right views."

Meanwhile, the White House remained silent. Finally, 24 hours later, POTUS announced his criticism of violence "from many sides."

Then came the Trump Tower debate with reporters. It was immediately praised by Andrew Anglin, creator of the Nazi site "The Daily Stormer" in a blog post: "He didn't attack us, he implied that there was hate ... on both sides. So he implied the antifa are haters. There was virtually no counter-signaling of us all."

The next day, Sen. Lindsey Graham, Republican critic

of Trump, emphasized Trump's "moral equivalency."

"Through his statements yesterday, President Trump took a step backward by again suggesting there is moral equivalency between the white supremacist neo-Nazis and KKK members who attended the Charlottesville rally and people like Ms. Heyer. I, along with many others, do not endorse this moral equivalency." He continued: "Many Republicans do not agree with and will fight back against the idea that the Party of Lincoln has a welcome mat out for the David Dukes of the world."

Senator John McCain, whom Trump called out at the news conference for not voting for the GOP wealth care bill, tweeted, "There's no moral equivalency between racists & Americans standing up to defy hate & bigotry. The President of the United States should say so"

At least ten Republican Senators have criticized Trump for his moral equivalency regarding the White Supremacists and their opponents in Charlottesville.

How is this resonating among the Christian voters who elected Trump? 60% of white Catholics and 81% of white Evangelicals voted for him. POTUS has given them what they wanted: a new Supreme Court Justice pledged to end legal abortions.

Was his Charlottesville response an indication of POTUS delivering on other issues white Christian voters desire? POTUS using the bully pulpit to explicitly favor restoring this nation to its historic culture before World War II. The stated goal of the militant groups POTUS defended at Charlottesville is the restoration of a white Christian ethno-nationalist state. Trump's ban on Muslim immigration responded to their wish. His latest plan to restrict entry to the US to those already speak-

Along with a great collection of classic cars and trucks, the building will be open for everyone to see the progress we've made and all that still needs to be done. Come on by and take a look. You can also see the progress on the new aquatic facility.

Randy Clayton and I worked on the central main support pole and mechanism last week. Except for a couple of final adjustments, it is ready to start putting on the radiating "sweeps" that will support the framework for all of the elements that everyone sees at merry-go-rounds everywhere, as well as the mechanical parts

that rotate the platform and make the horses go up and down.

However, that work will have to wait for completion of the walls and ceiling, heating ductwork, and other projects that have a lot of floor space taken up by materials waiting to be put in place. ### Can You Save for College and Retirement?

Few of us have unlimited financial resources — which means that almost all of us need to prioritize our financial goals. Consequently, you'll have some decisions to make if you'd like to help pay for your children's college educations someday while, at the same time, saving for your own retirement.

Your first step in addressing these objectives is to maintain realistic expectations. Consider the issue of paying for college. Right now, the average four-year cost (tuition, fees, room and board) is about \$80,000 for in-state students at public universities and approximately \$180,000 for private schools, according to the College Board. And these costs are likely to keep rising in the years ahead. Can you save this much for your kids' education?

Instead of committing yourself to putting away this type of money, take a holistic approach to saving for your children's higher education. After all, you probably won't be the only one to help pay for college. Depending on your income and assets, your family might be eligible for some needs-based financial aid awarded by the college. Also, you should encourage your children to apply for as many schol-

arships as possible — but keep in mind that most scholarships don't provide a "full ride." Here's the bottom line: Don't assume you will receive so much aid that you don't need to save for college at all, but don't burden yourself with the expectation that you need to pick up the full tab for your children's schooling.

On a practical level, you may want to commit to putting a certain amount per month into a college savings vehicle, such as a 529 plan. You can generally invest in the 529 plan offered by most states, but in some cases, you may be eligible for a state income tax incentive. Also, all withdrawals from 529 plans will be free from federal income taxes, as long as the money is used for a qualified college or graduate school expense of the beneficiary you've named. (Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified education expenditures may be subject to federal and state taxes and a 10% penalty on the earnings.)

By starting your 529 plan early, when your children are young, you'll give the investments within the plan more time to grow. Plus, you can make smaller contributions on a regular basis, rather

than come up with big lump sums later on. And by following this approach, you may be in a better financial position for investing in your IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. Obviously, it's to your benefit to contribute as much as you can to these plans, which offer tax advantages and a wide range of investment options. If you're investing in a 401(k) or similar employer-backed plan, try to boost your contributions every time your salary increases. At the very least, always put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

And once your children are through with college, you can discontinue saving in your 529 plan (although you may want to open another one in the future for your grandchildren) and devote more money to your retirement accounts.

It can certainly be challenging to save for education and retirement — but with discipline and perseverance, it can be done. So, give it the "old college try."

## Exercise - Why and How?

As Ida and I get close to the start of another session of Healthy Lifestyle Classes, I thought we would look at the specifics of why we should exercise and how we can stick to it. The reasons for exercising can be very good motivation for finding ways to find an exercise program you like and can stick to for the long term.

Experts speculate that a sedentary lifestyle is an actual cause of much of prediabetes cases in those under the age of sixty. We do know that a sedentary lifestyle puts one at an increased risk for Type 2 Diabetes. And since we are part of a National database, we know that taking our Healthy Lifestyle Classes, where we strongly encourage participants to exercise decreases the participants' chance of getting Type 2 Diabetes. Exercise increases insulin sensitivity and promotes utilization of blood glucose, both of which will help in the prevention of Type 2.

Labor-saving devices and on-line services can make our lives easier while also making it so we don't have to move much. Look at your day and if it typically includes long-periods of



time when you don't move, you know where to start to increase activity.

Research indicates that finding your passion and motivation for exercising

greatly increases your chance of succeeding in a life-long program. Once the decision is made to exercise, whether it's to feel better, for better health, to perform activities of daily living better or to get stronger or more flexible, the next step is to experiment until you find a program you enjoy.

We've already discussed ways to add more steps to your day. If you are parking further away, taking regular breaks from sitting at work or home and moving around during commercials and breaks when watching television or movies, then you are ready to move on to a regular schedule of working out.

If you are motivated to work out alone, jump into various activities and see what you like best, or mix it up if you are easily bored. Many of us do better with a work-out partner. These partners can be supportive and can often be found in our own households. It could be a friend you would like to spend more time with, or even someone you know who could benefit more than you from an exercise program and you could be supporting them with their journey to better fitness and health.

If you are able to join a gym, or already have a membership, take the time to explore the options for working out alone, with a partner or in a class. Including resistance training at some point in time is especially beneficial for building muscle and bone strength. It allows you to increase your ratio of muscle to fat. Many of us do better with a work-out partner. Unfortunately for us gals, this happens faster for guys, due to their testosterone. However, it is still beneficial to both sexes.

If you are exercising regularly, keep it up, but consider increasing time and/or intensity. Try switching it up every so often so your body doesn't get used to any one workout. If you are still on the fence, consider the health benefits mentioned above for motivation to get going. Remember, it is often difficult to begin exercising, but when you do, you'll feel better and not regret the change. You'll not only live longer, you will have a better quality of life!

### Diabetes Tidbit

Myth - Carbohydrates are bad if you have Diabetes

Carbohydrates are not bad. Our brain needs Carbs to function. However, it is important to monitor our portion sizes and what types of carbs we chose. We should focus on fruits, vegetables, and whole grains.

It is important to know if you have diabetes, you can have a cookie. You can have a piece of cake. It comes down to portion control. Women should keep their carb budget at 45-60 grams per meal and men should keep their carb budget at 60-75 grams per meal. This is true for all people with or without diabetes.

# The Great Outdoors

4th time a charm for Vang's eclipse viewing

The fourth time is a charm! With thousands of others, my wife and I went to Idaho to watch the eclipse. We figured, realistically, that this would probably be our last chance to see this phenomenon. I've had several near misses.



The first time I saw a solar eclipse was June 30, 1954, when the path of the eclipse went right through Minneapolis, Minnesota.

It was a near miss. Our family farm was about 60 miles south of Minneapolis so it was a given that we'd miss the totality. I doubt that taking a drive an hour to the north would have occurred to my parents. Still, I remember getting up early that morning and all of us piling into the car to go out to one of our fields where we'd get an unobscured look at the celestial event taking place right after sunrise. Frankly, after all these years I don't remember how much of the actual eclipse we saw, or if we had some sort of eclipse glasses. We probably used photo

negatives.

The next eclipse was July 20, 1963. Incidentally, I didn't have those dates burned into my memory, but that trivia is easily retrieved with an internet search. In Fargo, North Dakota, where we were living, the eclipse wasn't that

close, but I remember being outside with our son, Kevin, then a nine-month old toddler, and seeing images of the eclipse in the multiple pin-hole camera effect from the leaves of a tree in our backyard.

On February 26, 1979, we had another close, but no cigar moment. We were living in Grafton, in northeast North Dakota and the eclipse was just to the north, in Canada. Kevin, then a junior in high school, went with a science class to Winnipeg, Manitoba, at the center of the path of the eclipse. Obviously, this was a simpler time, when going to Canada, and then returning to the U.S., didn't involve much more than the teacher vouching for the citizenship of his students.

At that time I did a weekly 5-minute live public service program about Social Security on a local radio station, and after I was done I hung on to chat

on-air about eclipses with one of the station personalities.

So, with those three near misses, it seemed appropriate to hit the road for Idaho on August 21 to finally see a total eclipse, so I'll share some of my observations.

First, we knew a lot of people were making an eclipse trip, but the volume of traffic on I-15 at sunrise surprised us, considering it wasn't even elk season.

We planned to head for the highway rest stop at Dubois, Idaho, figuring other people would be there as well. We weren't figuring that the rest stop, built large to accommodate lots of big trucks if Monida Pass was blocked by snowstorms, would be Eclipse City. The facility was jammed with motor homes, tents, RVs, cars, trucks and people. We found a parking spot next to a travel trailer from Kalispell. The owners had camped there the previous two nights to make sure they'd have a ringside seat to the eclipse.

If we thought the rest area was jammed, it was nothing compared

to the crush in the rest stop building, where long lines of people waited in line to use the facilities.

As the actual eclipse began and progressed, people settled down to watch, as the moon slowly crossed in front of the sun. As we approached totality we could see the sunlight dimming, and could feel the air temperature dropping. It grew darker and darker, and as the last sliver of sun



disappeared behind the moon, people began cheering. Like many, I was totally blown away by the spectacular sight of the corona around the moon and then the so-called diamond ring effect

just at the end of totality. Stunning and spectacular don't begin to describe it.

Some people say that experiencing a total eclipse is the thrill of a lifetime. I agree and now I regret those near misses.

# This Week In Labor History August 30th - September 5th

*"The liberty of a Democracy is not safe if the people tolerate the growth of private power to a point where it becomes stronger than the Democratic state itself. That in its essence is Fascism: ownership of government by an individual, by a group, or any controlling private power." -President Franklin D. Roosevelt*

**Wednesday, Aug 30:**

Delegates from several East Coast cities meet in convention to form the National Trades' Union, uniting craft Unions to oppose "the most unequal and unjustifiable distribution of the wealth of society in the hands of a few individuals." -1834  
 Poland: Polish government "allows" formation of independent Unions. The Unions were the leading force in bringing down the communist rule in Poland. When strong Unions are in place Liberty, Justice and Democracy are most assured, even Communism is no match to the power of free democratic Unions. -1980

**Thursday, Aug 31:**

10,000 striking miners began a fight at Blair Mountain, W.Va., for recognition of their Union, the United Mine Workers of America. Federal troops were sent in and miners were forced to withdraw after 16 strikers were murdered by the government. -1921  
 325,000 Union members gathered in Washington, D.C., for a Solidarity Day march and rally for workplace fairness and healthcare reform. -1991

**Friday, Sept 1:**

Walter Reuther is born. He went on to become a founder of the United Auto Workers and was president of the CIO when it merged with the AFL in 1955. Reuther was a supporter of political action who said "There's a direct relationship between the breadbox and the ballot box, and what the Union fights for and wins at the bargaining table can be taken away in the legislative halls." -1907  
 3 week strike starts in Woonsocket,

R.I., part of a national movement to obtain a minimum wage for textile workers, results in the deaths of 3 strikers. More than 420,000 workers struck nationally. -1934

**Saturday, Sept 2:**

The Battle of Blair Mountain ended on this date. Mine owners and the U.S. Government bomb West Virginia strikers by airplane using bombs filled with nails and metal fragments in order to protect mine owner profits. It's the first time the U.S. Government used planes to bomb its own citizens. The battle began after Sheriff Sid Hatfield (an ally of the Union miners and hero from the Battle of Matewan) was assassinated by the "Free Market" Capitalist. -1921  
 President Eisenhower (Republican) signs legislation greatly expanding Social Security by providing much wider coverage and including 10 million additional Americans, most of them self-employed farmers, with additional benefits. -1954

**Sunday, Sept 3:**

African-American cotton pickers organize and strike in Lee County, Texas, against miserably low wages and other injustices, including a growers' arrangement with local law enforcement to round up blacks on vagrancy charges, then force them to work off their fines on select plantations. Over the course of September a white mob put down the strike, murdering 15 strikers in the process. -1891  
 25 workers die, unable to escape a fire at the Imperial Poultry processing plant in Hamlet, N.C. Managers had locked fire doors to protect profits by preventing the possible theft of chicken nuggets. 19 of the dead were single mothers. Disregarding Federal safety regulations to increase profits the plant had operated for 11 years without a single safety inspection. -1991

**Monday, Sept 4:**

Police and deputy sheriffs were relieved of their duties in Cripple Creek, Colorado, and all citizens were forced by a privatized security

force to register their firearms, as pro-Capitalist mine owners took over the town in an attempt to crush the labor Union. Governor Peabody also sent in the state militia to protect profits of the "Free Market" Capitalists from the workers who created the profits. -1903

In what many believe was to become the longest strike in U.S. history, 600 Teamster-represented workers walk out at the Diamond Walnut processing plant in Stockton, Calif., after the company refused to restore a 30-percent pay cut they had earlier taken to help out the company. The two sides ultimately agreed to a new contract after 14 years. -1991

**Tuesday, Sept 5:**

Palmer raids and America's first "Red Scare" begins on this date. Fed-

eral agents attack Industrial Workers of the World (IWW) Union halls and Union offices in 48 cities across the nation in order to crush America's growing labor movement on behalf of anti-Union "Free Market" Capitalists. The "Red Scare" destroyed the lives of thousands of good Americans and helped greedy corporations increase their profits by falsely associating all Unions with Communism. -1917

General strike begins across U.S. maritime industry, stopping all shipping. The strikers were objecting to the government's post-war National Wage Stabilization Board order that reduced pay increases negotiated by maritime Unions. -1946

*Green Pumpkin Pie*

In June of 2016, a side trip in Lake Placid, New York, took me to the farmstead of John Brown of Civil War notoriety. While reading the family history, mention was made of a family connection to Almanzo Wilder, through the wife of Mr. Brown. It was further noted, that a sister museum of Laura Ingalls Wilder fame, was open for tours in, Malone, New York. Since I was travelling solo, I decided to back track 40 or 50 miles and take the road to Malone.

What a delight to take a step back in time and enter the actual home where the sister of Almanzo threw a wad of steel wool covered in stove blacking at her brother. When he ducked, she was consigned to infamy, as the projectile smacked into the wall paper covered wall behind the stove, leaving a glaring blot in the family parlor. Read Farmer Boy by Laura Ingalls Wilder, for the rest of the story.

Of course, I couldn't pass up recipes from that era and those families. Following is an interesting example of some of the dessert fare of the day. My next mission will be tracking down a green pumpkin. If anyone could help me out and share an unripe pumpkin, I'll share some pie. **Green Pumpkin Pie**

- 2 Pie pastes
- 1 c. brown sugar
- small pinch of each: ground nutmeg, cloves and cinnamon
- 1 green (unripe) pumpkin, 4 pounds
- 9-inch pie pan

- 1/3 c. vinegar
- 1 tsp. butte

Butter pie pan and line with half the pie paste, Preheat oven to 425'. Cut pumpkin into quarters. Remove the seeds. Cut pumpkin into small slices.

Cover pie crust with brown sugar and spices and then place pumpkin slices on top. Pour 1/2 cup of vinegar over slices and add a piece of butte on top. Cover with other pie paste. Seal and flute edges and vent the top. Brush top of crust with sour cream and sprinkle lightly with sugar.

Bake at 425' for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to 350' and bake for 35-40 minutes longer, or until nicely browned and pumpkin tests done.
