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Public gets first look at Superfund cleanup agreement

After years of court-imposed secrecy, the parties involved in the conceptual Superfund agreement for the Butte Hill were finally able to release the first details about planned cleanup work at several public meetings held last week.

Representatives of the Environmental Protection Agency, Atlantic Richfield, the county and the state were on hand Wednesday, May 30 for a meeting with Butte-Silver Bow commissioners and two public meetings at the Montana Tech Auditorium. These meetings were the first opportunities for officials to talk about the conceptual agreement since District Court Judge Sam Haddon lifted portions of the gag-order related to the Butte Hill on May 22.


EPA Region 8 administrator Doug Benevento expressed relief that the long secrecy about the Butte Hill cleanup was over.

"Never again will you hear from us that we can't talk about it," he told the approximately 100 people gathered at the noon meeting at Montana Tech. "What you may hear is, we don't know or we're working on that."

The EPA released a number of documents earlier last week, including overviews of work to be done and a timeline for proceeding on a consent decree and record of decision amendment for the Butte Priority Soils Operable Unit and opportunities for public input. The documents also included information about the surface water compliance determination plan and the possibility that it may be technically unfeasible to meet state water quality standards and lower federal standards may be adopted for the BPSOU.

Major work proposed involves excavation and removal of tailings, waste and contaminated soils and construction of several large storm water catch basins and installation of groundwater control systems in the area between Texas Avenue and just west of Montana Street and cleanup of a number of smaller under-reclaimed and under-reclaimed sites on the Butte Hill.

According to one of the documents released last week, "As part of a BPSOU settlement, Atlantic Richfield would provide funding

to the state for certain Blacktail Creek work and for restoration actions coordinated and/or integrated with BPSOU remedy. The State would perform both the Confluence work at Blacktail Creek and the Parrot Tailings Waste Removal as restoration. The Confluence work would be performed by the Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) as part of its Blacktail Creek work. The Parrot Tailings Waste Removal continues to be implemented through the Montana Natural Resource Damage Program (NRDP)."

Some members of the noon meeting audience were dismayed that plans do not include building a free-flowing creek through the area between Texas Avenue and Montana Street as envisioned by the Restore Our Creek Coalition.

Long-time Butte environmental watchdog Fritz Daily said he considers the failure to include the creek in plans is a failure for the community. He said the community could take legal

action if a creek cannot be established.

Evan Barrett, a member of Restore Our Creek, asked whether the size of stormwater basins in the area along George Street would prevent construction of a creek from Texas Avenue to Montana Street.

Butte-Silver Bow Superfund Coordinator Jon Sesso said the basins would take up 25-35 percent of the tailings areas along the corridor to be cleaned up. He said under the proposed agreement, the surface in the area would not be inconsistent with future construction of a creek.

According to EPA officials, several public response sessions will be scheduled within the next few weeks.

Areas of planned Superfund cleanup

Butte Reduction Works

The Butte Reduction Works west of Montana Street was formerly used for copper, zinc and manganese production and currently is used for Butte-Silver Bow County's asphalt and crushing plant.

- County asphalt plant to be moved to another site.
- Proposed remedial construction performed by Atlantic Richfield Co.
- Excavate 165,000 cubic yards of tailings, waste and slag from south-

ern part of site, creating a 275-foot-wide corridor.

- Silver Bow Creek would be moved out of the slag canyon to the new corridor and the surrounding land revegetated.
- Hydraulic control system would be constructed to capture contaminated groundwater for treatment at Butte Treatment Lagoons; clean water discharged to Silver Bow Creek.
- Area would be reconstructed for

possible public recreational use.

Blacktail Creek and Confluence Area

- Atlantic Richfield Co. would install an underground system to capture contaminated groundwater for treatment at Butte Treatment Lagoons; clean water discharged to Silver Bow Creek.
- Montana Department of Environmental Quality would excavate tailings, wastes and contaminated

soils along Blacktail Creek near its confluence with Silver Bow Creek.

- MDEQ would reconstruct Blacktail Creek within riparian floodplain south of the Ulrich-Schotte Nature Trail and reconstruct Silver Bow Creek near existing alignment north of George Street.
- Area would be reconstructed in a manner that enables future community use of the site.

Everyone's new favorite major college football team should be the Central Florida Knights.

While the rest of the country went along with the rigged plan to give Alabama a phony national championship trophy, the Knights did their own thing.

They declared themselves champions.

Central Florida beat Auburn 34-27 in the Peach Bowl to finish the season as the only undefeated team in the country. But they weren't invited to the college football "playoffs," which includes all of four teams.

Auburn, by the way, beat Alabama 26-14 in the SEC Championship Game a little more than a month earlier, but for some reason that game didn't count.

Central Florida finished No. 6 in the ranking, and the Knights re-

ceived just six of the 63 first-place votes in the AP Top 25 Poll. The other 57 rubes voted for Alabama, the paper champion.

The Knights called Bravo Sierra on the crooked system and raised their own championship banners.

Banners that read "National Champions – The Only 2017 Un-defeated Champion" can be seen around the campus. The Knights will have a permanent national champion banner hanging at their stadium.

You can buy Central Florida national championship merchandise, and the coaches received national championship bonuses. They even had a national championship parade.

Since college football's system to define a national champion is unfair and borderline corrupt, the Knights should be celebrated for what they did during and after the 2017 season.

Were they the best team? Probably not. But we'll never know because of a rigged system designed to make ensure an SEC team is called the champion.

Butte High needs to follow the Knights and add a 1996 Class AA State Softball Championship banner to its collection of titles inside the Ross J. Richardson Memorial Gymnasium.

The Bulldogs of 22 years ago were not robbed by the system. They got the shaft from something nobody can control, Mother Nature.

Butte High went to Billings as a favorite to win the state championship at Stewart Park. But the rain wouldn't let up, and the Class AA and Class A State tournaments were completely washed out.

The Montana Standard ran a Sunday headline that read "State softball trophies stay in the box."

Defending state champion Butte High won 15 of 19 games in 1996, and the Bulldogs went undefeated in Western AA play as they looked for their third title in school history. Butte High also won in 1992, the second year of the program's existence.

Billings West was the Eastern AA champion, and the Golden Bears, too, felt 1996 was their year.

Jeni Hope was a sophomore on that 1996 Butte High team.

"I remember all of us in the hotel room, and we were crying," she said. "Would we have won? Who knows. But damn we wanted to play so bad."

At the time, there was no backup plan for the weather. If that happens now, they will move the tournament. Three years later, rain forced he Class A State tournament from Butte to Anaconda, where Butte Central completed an undefeated season on fields built to handle water.

In the week following the 1996 washout, Bruce Saylor wrote a column in the Standard calling for such a backup plan. After taking a nice little shot at a Billings Gazette writer who wrote that Butte should never host a state track meet again because of cold weather in 1984, he quoted Butte High head coach Jim Hope.

"We didn't play all season just to be an asterisk in the book," Hope said. "There's no closure. The season never ended.

"It was a tough (Saturday) morning when I had to tell the girls. Especially our seniors. They'd made a pact when they were freshman that they were going to win the state championship this year. Now they won't get the chance. There were a lot of tears. A lot of tears."

Billings West coach Ed Kriscovich was equally devastated.

"My feeling is that I'm sorry for the kids," Kriskovich told John Letasky of the Gazette. "We've got five seniors who have worked hard, and the chance to win a state championship has been taken away from them by natural circumstances."

Chances to win the state title do not come along very often. It wasn't until 15 years later that the Bulldogs won their third title with that magical 2011 run in Billings.

The Montana High School Association did the best it could to handle a rainy situation in Billings.

The possibility of rescheduling the tournament was discussed, but ultimately the MHSA decided not to box the trophies after all.

Butte High and West were to receive first-place trophies because they won their divisional titles. Missoula Big Sky and Great Falls Russell took second-place trophies, and Missoula Hellgate and Billings Senior received third-place trophies.

Whether it was said or not, Butte High took that to mean they were co-champions of the state.

If you look at the list of past champions on the MHSA website, however, the year 1996 has no champion for Class AA or Class A. Every other year since softball became an MHSA sport in 1986 has a champ.

The paper on the Memorial Day following the rain listed 10 Butte High players who received post-season awards.

That list included junior pitcher Jori Peterson and her 12-0 record, senior second baseman Shannon Crowley and her .930 fielding percentage, junior shortstop Heidi McCarthy and her .323 average, senior center fielder Beth Toivonen and her .438 average, and right fielder Jeni Hope and her .471 average.

Seniors Mandi Ueland, Amanda Evans and Chrissy Leathers, junior Kristen Uggetti and sophomore Keli Renz also received all-conference awards.

Those awards are nice, but they seemed hollow following the lost state tournament.

All these years later, it is time to celebrate those Bulldogs by recognizing the state title they thought was there. What those players deserve now is that banner.

Let the Billings West raise a banner, too. If the NCAA can have co-champions, so can Montana high school softball.

USC and LSU shared the title in 2003. NCAA teams shared championships three times in the 1990s.

The 1996 players deserve closure, and there is no better closer than a banner-raising ceremony.

Just as the Central Florida Knights called out the NCAA and told the world that they were the true champions of college football, the Bulldogs could thumb their nose at Mother Nature and declare themselves co-champions once and for all.

Universal Athletic could make up some "1996 State Championship" merchandise.

They could sell it at the parade.

What's Cooking

Pork Chops to barbecue

Before I get to the meat of the column today, I have a couple of rhubarb thoughts. (Stay with me now. Not another rhubarb recipe this time. Just a story.)

I was attending a celebration of life service, for a family member in Belt this past week. While funerals are a bitter sweet time, special memories abound within those occasions. My cousins' wife was fond of making use of any available produce for cooking or baking. You are right. Rhubarb was part of those memories. In a salute to that spring staple of the area, there was a great selection of rhubarb bread, cakes and bars. In case you're wondering, I enjoyed sampling my way through them. They were very delicious, if I do say so myself.

I'll change things up then, with this recipe for pork chops that includes a made from scratch barbecue sauce. I've made this sauce for more than, well; I've had it a long time. We always enjoy it. Judging from the back of the well-used clipping, this recipe came from the Whitehall Ledger newspaper. I'm sorry that I don't have the name of the cook. Here's to nice summer with meals around the grill, with family and friends.

Barbecued Pork Chops

- 1 c. Ketchup
- 3/4 c. dry white wine (or apple cider vinegar)
- 1 beef bouillon cube
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1/2 tsp. dry mustard
- 1/8 tsp. ground cloves
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 c. maple syrup
- 1/4 c. water
- 1 tsp. crumbled dry, basil
- 1 tsp. crumbled thyme
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1/4 tsp. ground ginger
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 4 1 1/2 inch thick pork chops

In saucepan, combine ketchup, syrup, wine (or vinegar), water, bouillon and seasonings. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Place chops on grill about 5 inches from heat source. Cook 20 minutes. Turn chops, cook 10 to 15 minutes more, brushing occasionally with ketchup mixture. Add additional sauce at serving if desired.

Much to consider in Superfund cleanup plan

Last week, the public finally got a look at the Superfund cleanup work proposed under the conceptual agreement reached by parties involved in working toward a consent decree for the Butte Priority Soils Operable Unit, or informally, the Butte Hill.

As representatives of the EPA, Atlantic Richfield Co., Butte-Silver Bow and the State of Montana said at public meetings last week, it's been a long wait. On May 22, District Judge Sam Haddon agreed to lift part of the gag-order governing Superfund negotiations so that the parties involved could release technical information about work proposed for the Butte Hill to the public. The parties involved seemed genuinely relieved that the long-imposed secrecy was over and they could finally talk about plans.

There's a lot of information to digest in the documents that have been revealed so far about the cleanup and the public already had many questions and comments for officials last week. It's a good thing the EPA plans to hold more public meetings in the next few weeks.


From what we've seen so far, the cleanup proposed is indeed a widespread and robust one along the crucial corridor from Texas Avenue to west of Montana Street that will also address many sites on the hill that were either unreclaimed or underreclaimed. The plan calls for removal of many tons of mining wastes from a number of sites, including the crucial Northside Tailings, East Side Diggings and the Blacktail Berm.

Those involved in the cleanup have a tough balancing act to accomplish. The plan seeks not only to remove these areas of "dirty dirt" but to capture and treat stormwater runoff from the hill and polluted groundwater. And, the plan includes a good deal of restoration work to contribute to the health of Blacktail and Silver Bow Creeks and leave the land in a state suitable for use by the public.

One of the concerns raised by those attending public meetings last week were that under the agreement, it appears Atlantic Richfield will not be paying for the removal of the Parrot Tailings. The state's Natural Resource Damages Program is in charge of the project and some are angry that dollars earmarked for restoration will be used for the cleanup.

Officials said, though, that Atlantic Richfield will be paying for a good deal of other restoration work in other areas of the project.

Another concern is that even after all the remedial work is done, it may not be possible to meet the state's stringent water quality standards in the BPSOU for copper



and zinc, particularly during storm events. Part of the agreement is to amend the 2006 Record of Decision to allow adoption of lower federal water quality standards through the area which are still protective of aquatic (and human) life.

Yet another concern raised was that the plan does not include construction of a meandering creek through the reclaimed corridor, a vision promoted by the Restore Our Creek Coalition.

Officials were quick to point out that nothing in the plan would preclude the building of such a creek, using clean water pumped from Atlantic Richfield's planned water treatment plant for the Berkeley Pit.

From what we've learned so far, the cleanup plan is going to address a lot of the major environmental concerns along the Silver Bow Creek and Blacktail corridors in that crucial "first mile." More importantly, it looks like the parties involved in reaching a consent decree sincerely want to be open with the public and are seeking public input.

We've got a long way to go, and we're sure there will be plenty more details and information coming out in the next few months. If last week's meetings were any indication, though, we're off to a good start on the cleanup Butte deserves.

Are We Stuck with Trumps Forevermore?

"Why did working class voters choose a selfish, thin-skinned, petulant, lying, narcissistic, boastful, megalomaniac for president?" That's the question Robert Reich addressed to Democratic Party leaders last month.

He provided them two alternative answers: (1) Due to their economic hardship, "the working

class fell for Trump's economic populism." (2) Because of "whites' fear of losing status to blacks and immigrants, they were attracted to Trump's form of identity politics – bigotry."

If Democrats choose the second answer, then Reich writes, they might "be more inclined to foster their own identity politics of women, blacks, and Latinos," and "less inclined to come up with credible solutions to widening inequality and growing economic insecurity."

Reich's lesson: "The truth isn't found in one explanation or the other. It's in the interplay between the two." How so?

Reich reminds us "racism and xenophobia aren't exactly new to American life. Fears of blacks and immigrants have been with us since the founding of the Republic."

However, since Reagan "wages and economic prospects of the typical American worker have stagnated. Two-thirds now live paycheck to paycheck, and those paychecks have grown less secure."

Good-paying jobs industrial jobs were exported. Unemployment is below 4% but "millions continue to work part-time who want steady jobs or they're too discouraged to look for work."

Since Reagan, "all the economy's gains have gone to the richest 10% mostly the top 1%. Wealthy individuals and big corporations have been investing in politics. They're "calling the shots in Washington – obtaining subsidies, tax breaks, tax loopholes, and bailouts."

Wall Street's deregulated greed tumbled us into the 2008 Great Recession, "costing millions their jobs, homes, and savings. But big banks got bailed out and not a single Wall Street executive went to jail."

In 2016, Reich's book tours taught him that the damaged survivors knew the system was "rigged" against them, "a surprising number" choosing Sanders or Trump – the two anti-establishment

candidates who promised to 'shake up' Washington."

Democrats failed "to remedy wage stagnation and widening inequality when they had the chance" (in 2009-2010).

For Reich, Clinton's "New Democrat" legacy was "opening trade with China, deregulating Wall Street, and balancing the budget." Obama bailed out the banks and Obamacare "didn't alleviate the financial stresses on the working class, particularly in states refusing to expand Medicaid." In 2016, Hillary made small promises, "none big enough to make a difference."

Democrats left room for "Trump's racism and xenophobia – focusing the cumulative economic rage on scapegoats that had nothing to do with its causes. It was hardly the first time in history a demagogue has used this playbook." Reich concludes, "If America doesn't respond to the calamity that's befallen the working class, we'll have Trumps as far as the eye can see."

What's the chance for a different future?

Reich credits "a few Democrats" for getting the message, "talking about ideas: government-guaranteed full employment, single-payer health care, industry-wide collective bargaining, and a universal basic income. "But none has yet offered a way to finance these things, such as a progressive tax on wealth."

"Nor have they offered a credible way to get big money out of politics. Even if 'Citizens United' isn't overruled, big money's influence could be limited with generous public financing of elections, full disclosure of the source of all campaign contributions, and a clampdown on the revolving door between business and government."

For Reich, Trump is "the consequence – the product of years of stagnant wages and big money's corruption of our democracy. If

they really want to stop Trump and prevent future Trumps, Democrats will need to address these causes of Trump's rise."

Norman Soloman's Truthdig.org column in May focused on the current fight within the Democratic Party over Superdelegates to their 2020 nominating convention. As context, Soloman notes that this year "the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee has been favoring establishment candidates over progressive opponents in party primaries from California to Texas to Pennsylvania."

After that setup, he describes

the influence of Clintonite "New Democrat" party officers like Elaine Kamarck on the Rules and Bylaws Committee. She's working to ensure that the 700 Superdelegates loyal to Hillary Clinton continue to block economic reform movements. Soloman writes that Kamarck's real day-job is "working to lower corporate taxes." She's co-chair of the big business organization RATE (Reforming America's Taxes Equitably) Coalition. RATE's explicit mission is "reducing the corporate income tax rate."

Kamark won't be trying "to get big business money out of politics."

Saying "I Do" Might Mean "I Can't" for Roth IRA

June is a popular month for weddings. If you are planning on tying the knot this month, it's an exciting time, but be aware that being married might affect you in unexpected ways – including the way you invest. If you and your new spouse both earn fairly high incomes, you may find that you are not eligible to contribute to a Roth IRA.

A Roth IRA can be a great way to save for retirement. You can fund your IRA with virtually any type of investment, and, although your contributions are not deductible, any earnings growth is distributed tax-free, provided you don't start withdrawals until you are 59-1/2 and you've had your account at least five years. In 2018, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to your Roth IRA, or \$6,500 if you're 50 or older.

But here's where your "just married" status can affect your ability to invest in a Roth IRA. When you were single, you could put in the full amount to your Roth IRA if your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) was less than \$120,000; past that point, your allowable contributions were reduced until your MAGI reached \$135,000, after which you could no longer contribute to a Roth IRA at all. But

once you got married, these limits did not double. Instead, if you're married and filing jointly, your maximum contribution amount will be gradually reduced once your MAGI reaches \$189,000, and your ability to contribute disappears entirely when your MAGI is \$199,000 or more.

Furthermore, if you are married and filing separately, you are ineligible to contribute to a Roth IRA if your MAGI is just \$10,000 or more. So, as a married couple, how can you maximize your contributions? The answer may be that, similar to many endeavors in life, if one door is closed to you, you have to find another – in this case, a "backdoor" Roth IRA.

Essentially, a backdoor Roth IRA is a conversion of traditional IRA assets to a Roth. A traditional IRA does not offer tax-free earnings distributions, though your contributions can be fully or partially deductible, depending on your income level. But no matter how much you earn, you can roll as much money as you want from a traditional IRA to a Roth, even if that amount exceeds the yearly contribution limits. And once the money is in the Roth, the rules for tax-free withdrawals will apply.

Still, getting into this back door is not necessarily without cost. You must pay taxes on any money in your traditional IRA that hasn't already been taxed, and the funds going into your Roth IRA will likely count as income, which could push you into a higher tax bracket in the year you make the conversion.

Will incurring these potential tax consequences be worth it to you? It might be, as the value of tax-free withdrawals can be considerable. However, you should certainly analyze the pros and cons of this conversion with your tax advisor before making any decisions.

In any case, if you've owned a Roth IRA, or if you were even considering one, be aware of the new parameters you face when you get married. And take the opportunity to explore all the ways you and your new spouse can create a positive investment strategy for your future.

Muskie fishing a highlight of Indiana trip

What do we think of if the topic is Indiana?

I suspect for we, who live in the West, it might be basketball or the Indi 500. As my wife and I looked forward to taking a road trip to Fort Wayne, Indiana, for the annual conference of the Outdoor Writers Association of America, we were anticipating a visit with our son and his family in Minot, North Dakota and a scenic excursion across the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

Muskie fishing wasn't exactly on our radar screen. That changed when conference planners sent out a list of pre-conference outings that included muskie fishing on nearby lakes.

While we might think of Indiana as an agricultural state (and it is), several counties in northeastern Indiana are blessed with an abundance of lakes, both small and large, including Lake Wawasee, Indiana's largest natural lake, plus other lakes that support a muskie fishery.

The muskie, or muskellunge,

to be more correct, is a cousin to the northern pike. Muskies are native to northern states, such as Wisconsin and Minnesota, but have been stocked in a number of other states, including Indiana.

Jill Boggs, executive director of the Kosciusko County Convention and Visitors Bureau (visitkosciuskocounty.org), arranged a big Hoosier welcome for my wife and I and two other writers, Bob Baldwin of Michigan and Jay Ledbetter of Colorado. She arranged lodging at a great, classic lakeside lodge, Oakwood Inn, on Lake Wawasee, and guided muskie fishing on nearby Lake Webster with one of the area's top muskie guides, Chae Dolsen (websterlakeguideservice.com).

After introductions and some instruction on the heavy duty casting rods we'd be using, we boated out to the middle of the lake, which Chae (pronounced Shay) knows like the back of his hand. He said the lake was once a series of several smaller lakes, but the local Tippecanoe River was dammed up; merging the lakes into one large lake, with lots of weed beds in relatively shallow areas.

Chae said muskies were intro-

duced in 1979 and after a rocky start have thrived in a number of lakes. Chae grew up as a fishing enthusiast and at one time made some tentative ventures into tournament bass fishing. But, he said, "I like to catch big fish, and muskies were the biggest fish around." He started specializing on muskies and developed a local reputation for having the knack for catching muskies, and friends encouraged him to start guiding.

He has mostly given up his previous business as a siding contractor to chase muskies, and he lives, eats and breathes muskie fishing from spring until the lakes freeze in early winter.

Muskies have a reputation for being unpredictable and contrary. That reputation, we neophyte muskie anglers quickly learned, is well justified.

We were throwing a variety of muskie lures and we'd occasionally see, as we brought the lure back to the boat, fish emerging from the depths, apparently interested in our lures. The standard technique is to move the lure in the water in a figure 8-pattern to hopefully trigger a strike. Most of the time, however, the fish would silently disappear

back into the deep water, much to our disappointment.

Bob broke the spell, at one point, when a small muskie took his lure. It was on just a couple seconds before flipping the lure and escaping.

We were near the end of our outing, still striking out, when a muskie hit my lure. This one didn't get away, and Chae quickly netted the fish and brought it in.


It wasn't a monster fish, by any means, but it still measured 32-inches, so a respectable muskie, though In-Fisherman magazine reported on a recent record muskie, caught in Michigan, that measured a formidable 58-inches and weighed 58-pounds.

My fish wasn't in that class, but I was tickled pink with my catch. I have done a lot of fishing over the years, but that was my first (and likely last) muskie of my lifetime.

So, if and when travels bring me back to Hoosier country, I'm going fishing.

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

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This Week In Labor History

Wednesday, June 6:

Debtor's prisons abolished. -1778
 A general strike by 12,000 autoworkers and others in Lansing, Mich., shuts down the city for a month in what was to become known as the city's "Labor Holiday." The strike was precipitated by the arrest of 9 workers, including the wife of the auto workers local Union president: The arrest left 3 children in the couple's home unattended. -1937

Thursday, June 7:

State militia sent to Cripple Creek, Colorado to suppress a Western Federation of Miners (WFM) strike. Rockefeller owns the police and the entire state and makes various promises of peace, and then breaks them all by murdering men, women and children in order to keep his profits up. The WFM was founded in Butte Montana and was considered to be a "Radical" Union by the capitalists because they had the audacity to ask for less deadly working conditions and fair wages. -1907
 The Industrial Workers of the World (IWW): Pageant of Paterson Silk Strike performed at Madison Square Garden, New York City. In an effort to financially support the Paterson

silk strike, artists based in Greenwich Village, New York, organized the play in which the events of the strike were reenacted. During the strike over 1,850 strikers were arrested, including IWW leaders William Dudley Haywood and Elizabeth Gurley Flynn. The pageant drew a large crowd. -1913
 Textile workers in Gastonia, North Carolina Strike. Police Chief Adersholt is accidentally killed by one of his own officers, 6 strike leaders are blamed and get convictions of "conspiracy to murder" and prison sentences of 5 to 20 years. -1929

Friday, June 8:

Colorado Militia attack striking mine workers at Dunnville, ends with 6 WFM Union members murdered and 15 taken prisoner. 79 of the strikers are deported, courtesy of Rockefeller, who owns the state government and militia. -1904
 Butte, Montana: Granite Mountain/Speculator Mine Fire kills 168 men in worst disaster in American metal mining history. "An appalling site that caused the strongest hearts to quail was the cremation of two men who were trapped like rats in a double-decked cage about 20 feet above the collar of the shaft, with flames flying from the shaft like a gigantic torch around them." -1917

Saturday, June 9:

Helen Marot is born in Philadelphia to a wealthy family. She went on to organize the Bookkeepers, Stenogra-

phers and Accountants Union in New York, and to organize and lead the city's 1909-1910 Shirtwaist Strike. In 1912, she was a member of a commission investigating the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire. -1865
 American Railway Union convenes in Chicago, representing 465 local Unions. On the 26th they call a sympathy strike for Pullman workers. "The dance of skeletons bathed in human tears - goes on forever unless you, the American Railway Union, stop it; end it; crush it out!" -Jennie Curtis, President of ARU Local 269. -1894
 Joseph Welch asks U.S. Senator Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis) "Have you no sense of decency, sir?" during Senate hearings. McCarthyism destroyed thousands of innocent lives during America's infamous "Red Scare/McCarthyism" era. McCarthy, later censured by the Senate, died of alcoholism and will forever be known as the shame of our country. -1954

Sunday, June 10:

A massive strike by miners occurred in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. In order to prevent scabs from working the mines while they were on strike, workers destroyed and seized mines. The strike was broken after the state declared martial law in order to protect the company profits. -1892
 The Mayor of Monroe, Mich. organizes a vigilante mob of 1,400 armed with baseball bats and teargas to break the picket line of 200 striking workers at Newton Steel. Picketers

are severely beaten and many hospitalized. 16 workers' cars were destroyed, 5 cars overturned, and 8 more were dumped into the River Raisin. -1937

Monday, June 11:

Pacifist, Progressive Republican (Republicans were once the progressive Party), Union supporter and first Women U.S. Representative Jeannette Rankin born, near Missoula, Montana. -1880
 Metal Mine Workers Union strike begins in Butte, Montana. The new Union, formed to protest the draft for World War I and the rustling card system, find special impetus following the Granite Mountain disaster of the 8th (worst disaster in US metal mining history). The Smelter workers held out until September 16th and the MMWU until December 28th. -1917

Tuesday, June 12:

50,000 members of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen employed in meatpacking plants walk off their jobs; demands include equalization of wages and conditions throughout U.S. plants. -1904
 Butte MT: Incident at Speculator mine when Muckie McDonald encourages fellow workers to refuse to show their Union cards. Evening shift workers at Speculator and Black Rock stay out in support of protesting workers. Walk-out stills 1,200 workers and starts a week of big trouble. -1914

Diggings East Area

- Excavate approximately 345,000 cubic yards of tailings, wastes and contaminated soils, including municipal waste.
- Construct an approximately 10-acre line stormwater basin.
- Remedial actions would be performed by Atlantic Richfield Company.
- Area would be reconstructed in a manner that enables future community use of the site and land around the stormwater basin.

Northside Tailings Area

- Excavate approximately 60,000 cubic yards of tailings, wastes and contaminated soils, including municipal wastes.
- Construct a stormwater basin or sedimentation bay, lined or unlined stormwater basin or sedimentation bay and associated channels and swales to cover about 3 acres.

- Remedial construction activities would be performed by Atlantic Richfield Company.
- Area would be reconstructed to enable future community use of the site and land around the stormwater basin or sedimentation bay.

Buffalo Gulch Area

- Excavate approximately 30,000 cubic yards of tailings wastes and contaminated soils, including municipal wastes.
- Construct an 8-acre stormwater basin, partially or fully lined.
- Remedial construction activities would be performed by Atlantic Richfield Company.
- Area would be reconstructed to enable future community use of the site and land around the basin, although the basin is expected to occupy most of the site.

Grove Gulch Area

- Excavate any tailings waste or contaminated soils found beneath the sedimentation bay and vegetated swale.
- Construct a sedimentation bay and vegetated swale parallel to Lexington Avenue just south of I-15/90 to capture stormwater from the Grove Gulch drainage.
- Remedial construction activities would be performed by Atlantic Richfield Company.
- All areas disturbed during construction would be regarded and vegetated. An access road and turnaround area may be constructed.

Uncontrolled Surface Flow Areas

- Areas remaining outside the proposed stormwater management projects and current stormwater controls will be evaluated to assess the potential impact of historic mining sources in those areas on

surface water quality in Silver Bow and Blacktail Creeks and additional controls would be constructed where needed.

- 12 sub-drainages, covering approximately 875 acres would be evaluated.
- Remedial activities will be performed by Atlantic Richfield Company.

Unreclaimed Areas

- 39 sites, covering nearly 90 acres in the BPSOU may require reclamation. Atlantic Richfield Company will evaluate each of these sites to determine if they were impacted by past mining and if they present a risk to human health or the environment. If so, the sites would be reclaimed.
- Following reclamation, each site will be incorporated for ongoing inspection and maintenance within the Butte Reclamation Evaluation System.
- Regular inspection and maintenance work would be funded by Atlantic Richfield Company and performed by Butte-Silver Bow.

Insufficiently Reclaimed Sites

- 26 historic mining-related sites (about 100 acres) were reclaimed to a standard that may not meet the requirements of the Butte Hill Re-vegetation Standards. These sites will be evaluated by Butte-Silver Bow County to see if they meet the BHRS requirements. If not, the sites would receive further reclamation.
- All proposed reclamation work would be performed by Butte-Silver Bow using funds provided by Atlantic Richfield Company.

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
