DEQ says part of Montana Pole plant may be cleared for industrial use

A spokesman for the Montana Department of Environmental Quality told commissioners last week that based on the results of a study, the department now believes 24 acres of the Montana Pole Plant area may be safe for industrial development once cleanup is completed.

David Bowers, the DEQ's project manager for the Montana Pole Plant Superfund site gave a presentation to the council of commissioners last week, the first such update since the department reported on the findings of its five-year review on the project last August. At that time, the department report stated that while treatment of contaminated soils at the plant had been successful in breaking down the most hazardous contaminant—PCP, a carcinogen—the treatment had not been successful in breaking down dioxin, another carcinogen.

State officials had also indicated that the site would be cleaned to "recreational standards," which caused some controversy because the county has long expected that the property would eventually be made suitable for mixed use, including commercial and industrial as well as recreational. The 40-acre site is located west of Montana Street and stretches from Silver Bow Creek to Mount Moriah Cemetery.

Bowers told commissioners that since the August report, results of soil studies indicate that the state can achieve industrial quality standards for most of the southwest portion of the area. The studies show that the higher levels of dioxins are concentrated in a thin, discrete layer near the soil surface and have not gone deeper into the soil. Bowers said once this top veneer is removed and buried with other waste in a 13-acre capped area, the land can be made to meet industrial standards, which are higher than those for recreational use.

Bowers said these standards are based on risk from exposure. Recreational use standards are based on infrequent use over a

shorter amount of time than industrial, in which workers would be on site regularly over a period of more years. The recreational standard for dioxins is 0.2 micrograms per kilogram of soil, while the industrial standard is 0.03 micrograms per kilogram.

Although the state is only required to clean the site to recreational use standards, Bowers said the new findings indicate that the DEQ and its contractors will be able to deliver a better cleanup than they had thought.

An engineered cap with a membrane and multiple layers of soil, gravel and other protective material will have to be installed on a 13-acre portion of the property over soils contaminated with PCP, dioxins and other hazardous wastes. Bowers said the cap is being designed to keep these materials from reaching groundwater as well as protecting the public from contact. Bowers said capped areas have been used successfully for recreational areas in other areas of the state, including the Copper Mountain recreation area, which is built on a cap over the old city landfill

Bowers said the 100-year

floodplain runs through the site and storm water plan will divert water around the capped area, but there is other work that could be done further up to prevent storm water from flowing into the site from Beef Trail Road.

Despite the reassurances from the DEQ, several commissioners expressed qualms about the state's plans to turn the property over to Butte-Silver Bow once cleanup is completed.

Commissioner Dan Foley asked what the state would do if the county decides not to take ownership of the property. He said he doubted any private buyer would be interested, knowing about waste in place and restrictions on use of the property.

Bowers said the state is not required to hand off the entire property, but could retain ownership of the capped area while turning over the rest to Butte-Silver Bow for industrial use.

Commissioner Cindy Perdue-Dolan said her constituents were unhappy with the capped waste-in-place solution and asked if contaminated soils could be moved off-site instead.

Bowers said if the only con-

taminant was dioxin, the soil could be moved, because the material is a mixed waste, the only feasible alternative is disposal onsite. He said the only other alternative would be transportation to southern Utah for incineration, which would require 50,000 truckloads, which would not be practical.

Butte-Silver Bow officials have also asked the state to look into alternative ways of treating the dioxin. Bowers told commissioners that while some new bioremediation technologies look promising, they are not achieving cleanup levels yet and would not be a wise investment at this time.

Jon Sesso, Butte-Silver Bow's Superfund coordinator, said the county is holding weekly meetings with the DEQ and its contractors on design decisions for the Pole Plant site. He said local officials are not convinced that there isn't an alternative treatment that can get more dioxin out of the soil and they expect the state to produce a full report on alternatives. He said they will not recommend to commissioners that they accept the property "unless it has value and provides use to the citizens."

Seriously, save your rosters from the Butte High-Butte Central basketball games this week. Then, when the high school honor rolls are published later this year, cross check the names and see what I mean.

More than half of the eight Butte High Class of 2017 valedictorians were stand-out athletes, proving that we are no longer living in the era of the dumb jocks.

Sure, we've had a few athletes who had the physical ability but not the mental capacity to go onto strong college careers over the years.

I knew a high school football player who definitely could have been an NFL prospect if he had opened the books once in a while, and I know a track athlete who could have gone to any Eastern Conference school if he could have spelled South Eastern Conference.

They are, however, very few and far between.

In the days when each high school sport is a 365-day job, only the highly-dedicated players rise to the top. More and more, the athletes who simply rely on their athletic ability get passed up by

dedicated athletes by their sophomore year.

Athletes who are that dedicated to their craft typically bring that same dedication to their studies, and dummies aren't going to be able to run the complex schemes we see in high school and college sports.

Take Butte High running back/linebacker Bo Mortensen, who recently signed to play football for Montana Tech, for example. He was so dedicated that he didn't realize until after the final game that he played every game of the 2017 season – without missing a practice – with a torn ACL in his knee.

Catherine Russo, the swimmer we might watch in the Olympics one day, spends more time on her books than she does in the pool, and that is saying a lot. She, too, has a 4.0 GPA.

Former Butte High School star football player and track athlete Dalton Daum could have gone to Harvard with his grades.

While she was becoming the all-time scoring leader – boy or girl – in the history of Butte High basketball, Lexie Nelson was earning straight A's on her report card.

Before he went to the University of Montana and the NFL, Colt Anderson was a member of the National Honor Society.

Believe me, I could go on and

on and on about the many Butte athletes who were also standing at the podium delivering valedictorian speeches and racking up major academic scholarship money, but I digress.

It is bigoted to think that our athletes are not good students. It is also 180 degrees wrong.

Student-athletes, who are also some of the best people you will ever meet, also have a lot more pressure to deal with. They are held to a much higher standard than students who don't play sports.

If they make a mistake, you read about it in the paper.

Sad to see Kmart closure

Last week, Sears Holdings Corporation, the parent company of Kmart, announced that it was closing 64 Kmart stores and 39 Sears locations, including Kmart stores in Butte and Helena. The company has been grappling for years with weaker in-store sales nationwide and Kmart stores in several other Montana communities have already been closed.

For Butte retail, the closure is another blow. Several years ago, J.C. Penney closed its store in the Butte Plaza Mall and the Mall's owners have been unsuccessful in recruiting another client to fill the space. These closures of large retail stores are of great concern to local development leaders and to the community at large.


We've long been part of the large chorus that urges our Butte neighbors to shop locally, we're afraid that such effort have little effect on the decisions of large corporations that are downsizing their inventory of brick-and-mortar stores. Internet shopping is growing by leaps and bounds. For big companies concerned with the bottom line, it's much more profitable to sell through large, centralized warehouses and ship products directly to consumers. Without the overhead of maintaining brick-and-mortar stores, with their employee, utility and maintenance costs, the companies can realize substantial savings and can offer lower prices and extra benefits like free shipping for consumers.

Unfortunately for communities like Butte, losing a large retailer really hurts. Although Sears Holdings has said it will be offering its associates the opportunity to transfer to its other stores, we're sure many will be unwilling to move their families from Butte and will be forced to look for another job here. That's tough on the workers and their families.

Besides the loss of jobs, Butte stands to lose tax revenue from the business. We're sure local development officials will be diligently searching for another retailer to take over Kmart's space, but it's a large piece of real estate to fill. With many corporations downsizing their retail store inventories, it's hard to imagine any waiting in the wings to take over such a large store.

For shoppers, the loss of Kmart will mean less choice in the local market for those day-to-day needs the store has supplied for many years. Located near the Butte Plaza Mall, Kmart was a convenient place to shop for many of us. While we didn't shop there every day, over the years we bought everything from clothing and household items to appliances and gardening supplies at Kmart.

So, we're sad that Butte has to say goodbye to the Blue Light

Rewarding Friends in Central America

Three days before Christmas, the US State Department officially recognized Juan Orlando Hernández, the current President of Honduras, as its democratically elected leader for another four years. For three weeks there had been widespread allegations of fraud in November's election. The Organization of American States and election observers from the US Congress had called for a new vote.

Immediately after the election, the State Department certified Honduras was making progress on human rights. That certification, allowed its government to receive millions in military aid, despite corruption scandals and human rights abuses that occurred under Hernández.

The Trump administration had no ambassador in Honduras, or even an Assistant Secretary of State for the western hemisphere. However Secretary of State Rex Tillerson decided within two days of the contested election that Hernández would be recognized regardless of the general international agreement that his election was fraudulent.

The Guardian's reporter, Sarah Kinoshian, noted that Tillerson's advisers chose to immediately recognize Hernández in order "to maintain stability." She also reported that Tillerson's decision risked a general "undermining" of US interests throughout Latin America. She quoted a former CIA analyst and current professor at Washington's American University, Fulton Armstrong:

"Over the short term, Hondu-

rans are going to be upset and protest. Over the medium and long term they are going to withdraw from confidence in democracy and withdraw from confidence in a US commitment to democracy. Their trust will drop even further in their government.

"The US is sacrificing support of the Honduran people and almost everything the US represents - democracy, anti-corruption - for what it thinks is stability. But how can you have stability without democracy?" asked Armstrong.

The Trump administration got an immediate reward for Tillerson's recognition of Hernández's right-wing government. Honduras became the ninth nation to oppose a United Nations resolution condemning the United States government's recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel. In a world containing but one superpower, that lonely superpower had ensured the loyalty of a trusted friend.

State Department spokesperson, Heather Nauert, told reporters that "The close election results, irregularities identified by the Organization of American States and the European Union's election observation missions, and strong reactions from Hondurans across the political spectrum underscore the need for a robust national dialogue. A significant long-term effort to heal the political divide in the country and enact much-needed electoral reforms should be undertaken."

Nauert also urged "all sides" to refrain from violence amid unrest that has claimed at least 17 lives - most of whom were protesters killed by security forces.

What meaning does "a robust national dialogue" have? Who will be responsible for making a "significant long-term effort to heal the political divide in Honduras and enacting those much-needed electoral reforms?" Will the annual continuation of hundreds of millions in military and security funding just announced by Tillerson include supplemental bucks for "community dialogue" involving "all sides"?

The State Department is providing us with meaningless proposals required to create what Noam Chomsky called "necessary illusions," illusions to trick us into believing that US interests in Honduras go beyond ensuring protection for corporate investors entrenched for decades in exploiting the impoverished country's natural resources.

According to the Guardian, twenty members of the House of Representatives sent a pre-Christmas letter to Tillerson, asking him to support the Organization of American States' demand for another election. They tried shaming him, noting the US "has spoken out forcefully to express concerns about electoral processes in Venezuela, Nicaragua, Bolivia and Cuba". This "forceful expression of concerns about electoral processes" was directed to four governments not dominated by right-wing, pro-international finance capitalist exploiters. Those four have all opposed the International Monetary Fund's demands for major reductions in government funding for public education, public transit, health care, housing, and nutrition programs.

Nearly 30 other lawmakers also called on Trump to "suspend all security assistance to Honduras," over abuses committed by security forces during the protests.

Domestically, economist Dean Baker published his analysis of Trump's tax victory. "These tax cuts are about giving more money to the richest people in the country. After four decades of the largest upward redistribution in the history of the world, the Republican tax cuts give even more money to the big winners."

"Rather than rebuilding our infrastructure, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, providing quality child care or affordable college, we're handing more money to Donald Trump and his family and friends."

Accountability

Last week, we talked about New Year Resolutions. Some of you are probably hitting it hard and resolved to stick with your resolutions and make them work. Some of you may be feeling guilty because you didn't get past the first few days of 2018 before you succumbed to your usual routine. And some of you probably didn't think it was worthwhile making resolutions or changes because it has been too difficult to follow through in the past. You could use someone to be accountable to. This is where the Diabetes Prevention Program Healthy Lifestyle Classes come into the picture.

People are more often successful with lifestyle changes with support than by themselves. Sure, there are always self-motivated people who are able to set goals, follow through and make big changes in their lives. Often these folks have support within their circle of friends and family. They are the exception rather than the rule. Most of us do better with some type of outside

two times each year. The next classes begin in February and we are taking appointments for evaluations now. And talk about support! We meet for sixteen weeks once each week and then monthly for eight months. Participants write down everything they eat and drink and how many minutes of activity they get in each day. Weight is monitored at each meeting and food and exercise logs are turned in. We also have expert speakers who talk about stress management and dietary guidelines.

Focusing on making healthy changes to diet, and finding both the time and the right mode to exercise, are popular aspects of the class for many past participants and most soon develop healthier routines. Class support and camaraderie are also among the favorite features of the class. At each meeting, the class participants share their successes and brainstorm solutions for those experiencing challenges.

Outcomes experienced by people taking the class are variable. It depends on regular

Diabetes Tidbit
Myth - Carbohydrates are bad if you have Diabetes
Carbohydrates are not bad. Our brain needs Carbs to function. However, it is important to monitor our portion sizes and what types of carbs we chose. We should focus on fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. It is important to know if you have diabetes, you can have a cookie. You can have a piece of cake. It comes down to portion control. Woman should keep their carb budget at 45-60 grams per meal and men should keep their carb budget at 60-75 grams per meal. This is true for all people with or without diabetes.

Diabetes Tidbit
People often times feel what they ate at dinner or bedtime has a direct impact on their blood sugar in the morning. This is not true. The fasting morning BG is controlled mostly by the overnight insulin level. You are probably not making enough insulin at night. This causes sugar to be released by the liver. The "Leaky Liver" puts more sugar in your blood and raises your blood sugar. This is frustrating because you may go to bed with a normal blood sugar, (80-140) and wake up higher and you did not eat all night. Please remember, there is more to diabetes than food.

attendance and active participation. For the one-hour per week commitment, the payback can be huge. In addition to losing weight, some people are able to reduce or eliminate medications; many reduce their numbers, like cholesterol, blood pressure and blood sugar; and most regularly exercise and are more aware of what they eat by the end of the program.

New classes start in February. One class now meets on Tuesdays at noon at the Southwest Montana Community Health Center. A second class is scheduled in an evening at St. James Healthcare with the day determined by availability of the current-session participants. To enroll in a class, set up a meeting for an assess-

ment with either Ida at St. James Healthcare, 723-2960, or Holly at SW MT Community Health Center, 723-4075, ext. 415.

MT FWP 2018-19 Season Setting Meeting

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks will hold public meetings throughout the state in January to provide information, answer questions, and gather input on the 2018-19 hunting season proposals adopted by the Montana Fish and Wildlife Commission earlier this month. The public meeting schedule for Region 3 is January 9: Butte United Congregational Church 6 p.m.-8 p.m.

Season structures and hunting district boundaries are adopted biennially for most game species. This happens every other year between December and final adoptions by the Fish and

Wildlife Commission in February. In proposing regulations to the Commission, FWP proposes adopting the existing 2017 structure except for specific changes. Proposals are based on population status or other circumstances.

The deadline for public comment is 5 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 24, 2018. Final adoption of the regulations will occur Feb. 15, 2018.

This Week In Labor History January 10th - January 16th

"We must guard against being fooled by false slogans, such as 'right to work.' It is a law to rob us of our civil rights and job rights. Its purpose is to destroy labor Unions and the freedom of collective bargaining by which Unions have improved wages and working conditions of everyone... Wherever these laws have been passed, wages are lower, job opportunities are fewer and there are no civil rights."

-Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

Wednesday, Jan 10:

In what is described as the worst industrial disaster in state history, the Pemberton Mill in Lawrence, Mass., collapses, trapping 900 workers, mostly Irish women. More than 100 die, scores more injured in the collapse and ensuing fire. Too much heavy machinery had been crammed into the building. (Before our pesky Federal regulations could get in the way of profits). -1860
Former AFL-CIO President George Meany dies at age 85. The one-time plumber led the labor federation from the time of the AFL and CIO merger in 1955 until shortly before his death. -1980

Thursday, Jan 11:

The IWW-organized "Bread & Roses" textile strike of 32,000 women and children begins in Lawrence, Mass. IWW leaders Bill Haywood and Elizabeth Gurley Flynn help lead the strike. It lasted 10 weeks and ended in victory. The legislature cut maximum working hours for women and children from 56 to 54 hours per

week and the employers had cut their pay along with the hours. The first mill-workers to walk out were Polish women, who, upon collecting their pay, exclaimed that they had been cheated and promptly abandoned their looms. Many were forced to send their children to live with supporters living in New York during the strike. -1912

Nearly two weeks into a sit-down strike at GM's Fisher Body Plant No. 2 in Flint, Mich., workers battle police when they try to prevent the strikers from receiving food deliveries from thousands of supporters on the outside. 16 strikers and 11 police were injured. The strikers were hit by buckshot fired by police riot guns; the police were injured principally by thrown nuts, bolts, door hinges and other auto parts. The incident became known as the "Battle of the Running Bulls". -1936

Friday, Jan 12:

Novelist Jack London is born. His classic definition of a scab - someone who would cross a picket line and take a striker's job: "After God had finished the rattlesnake, the toad, the vampire, He had some awful substance left with which He made a scab. A scab is a two-legged animal with a cork-screw soul, a water-logged brain, a combination backbone of jelly and glue. Where others have hearts, he carries a tumor of rotten principles". -1876

President John F. Kennedy signs Executive Order 10988, guaranteeing federal workers the right to join Unions and bargain collectively.

-1962

Saturday, Jan 13:

The original Tompkins Square Riot. As unemployed workers demonstrated in New York's Tompkins Square Park, a detachment of mounted police charged into the crowd, beating men, women and children with billy clubs. Declared Abram Duryee, the Commissioner of Police: "It was the most glorious sight I ever saw..." -1874

IWW organizer and singer/songwriter Joe Hill is falsely accused and arrested for killing two men during a grocery store hold-up in Utah. He ultimately is executed by firing squad (His last word was "Fire!") despite overwhelming evidence that he was framed and condemned solely for his association with the Industrial Workers of the World. When he was arrested was smiling and joked "I'm feeling pretty smart, and I'm also thinking about what I am going to do with that money at the end of the year." -1914

Sunday, Jan 14:

A Brooklyn trolley strike began on this date (lasting until Feb. 28). The militia was called out and martial law declared in order to suppress it. Members of the Knights of Labor battled militiamen in the streets. -1895
14,000 General Electric employees strike for two days to protest the company's mid-contract decision to shift an average of \$400 in additional health care co-payments onto each worker. -2003

Monday, Jan 15:

Wobbly Ralph Chaplin, in Chicago for a demonstration against hunger, completes the writing of the labor anthem "Solidarity Forever" on this date. He'd begun writing it in 1914 during a miner's strike in Huntington, W. Va. -1915
Martin Luther King Jr. born. People forget that Dr. King was every bit as committed to economic justice as he was to ending racial segregation. He fought throughout his life to connect the labor and civil rights movements, envisioning them as twin pillars for social reform. -1929

Tuesday, Jan 16:

Thousands of Palmer Raids detainees win right to meet with lawyers and attorney representation at deportation hearings. "Palmer" was the anti-Union U.S. attorney general under Woodrow Wilson. Palmer falsely accused Unions of being "Communists" and used the public's fear of Communism to crush the American Labor movement on behalf of the corporations. The offices of the IWW were raided and thousands of Wobblies (IWW members) were held without trial hundred were forcefully deported. -1920
Former UAW President Leonard Woodcock dies in Ann Arbor, Mich., at age 89. He had succeeded Walter Reuther and led the union from 1970 to 1977. -2001

The Great Outdoors

Memories of Jack Atcheson

There's a tradition on the popular CBS news program, Sunday Morning, that on the last Sunday of the year they do a "Hail and Farewell" segment, highlighting the passing of notable personalities during the year. The December 31 program highlighted a number of people, primarily from the entertainment industry, such as Mary Tyler Moore, Roger Moore, Mel Tillis, Glen Campbell, and Rose Marie, or the political world, including John Anderson, who ran as an independent for president in 1980, or in sports, boxer Jake LaMotta and football coach Ara Parseghian, and many others. As always, you don't really appreciate the impact of this review of deaths in a year until you put them together into a long list.

If the program took a broader look at the "who's who" of obituaries, they might have included a Butte man, Jack Atcheson, who died on December 27, at age 85.

What the people featured in CBS's Hail and Farewell meant in

the various worlds of entertainment, politics, and sports, Jack Atcheson was all that and more in the world of the outdoors, particularly big game hunting.

I've been reading outdoors magazines since I was a kid, starting when I'd check out outdoors magazines from my hometown library. A name that recurred again and again, especially in the context of big game hunting, was Jack Atcheson of Butte,



Montana. When reading accounts of exotic big game hunts by the likes of Jack O'Connor or Jim Zumbo, and other famous writers, chances are the article would have a credit to Jack Atcheson for making arrangements for the hunt, and often would further indicate that trophies were sent to Atcheson Taxidermy of Butte.

As it happened, shortly after

I transferred to the Butte Social Security Office in 1988, I saw a man sitting in the office waiting area. All our interviewers were tied up so I asked if I could help him. Sure enough, it was Jack Atcheson, and he had questions about Social Security to help with retirement planning. After I answered his questions I had more questions for him, as well as conversation regarding our shared interests in hunting and the outdoors. I remember advice he gave me. "Always have a camera with you. You never know when you might have the photo of a lifetime." Also, he advised, regarding outdoors activity, "Go now, while you're physically able," a recurring theme in his two books, *Hunting Adventures Worldwide* and *Real Hunting and Campfire Humor*.

After serving in the Army during the Korean War, Jack came home to Butte and started a taxidermy business, and through contacts he developed with outfitters around the world he, with his wife Mary Claire, who had a travel agency, started making arrangements to book hunts around the world. In the process, he went hunting around the world, often to check out the services of outfitters. In short, over his many years in the business, he went virtually everywhere in the world, and the adventures he had, and the people he

hunted with or met in the process of travel, could probably fill many books.

While Jack was a celebrity in the hunting world, he took much of it with humor. In a chat before a past Montana elk and deer season, Jack smiled and said, "There's a lot of luck with trophy hunting. Usually it's the guy stuck as camp cook that gets the biggest elk."

We once met in a grocery store parking lot and Jack asked what I had going on. As it happened, the next day I was planning to go on a horseback trip, covering a conservation project of the Backcountry Horsemen. He chuckled a bit and said, "Be careful. I'm often asked 'What's the most dangerous animal you've encountered?' I tell them it's the horse. I've known several people who were killed by horses."

Jack's inscription when he autographed his first book to me in 1995 would make a good epitaph. "I wish I could do it all over again. Life is too short."

Hail and farewell.

Oriental Steak Strips

Through the years I've acquired some interesting cookbooks and consequently met some interesting folks.

I received "The Bicentennial Beef Cookbook" (published by the Beef Industry Council) from the Cascade County Cowbelles. Inside the front cover is an inscription from the President of the group. It's been fun to watch the development of this woman over the years. She was active in various county activities, along with her family. About 10 years ago she decided to run for the Montana Senate and was elected. When I use this cookbook, I am reminded of good people that do good things all the way around.

Oriental Steak Strips

| 2 lbs. Beef round steak
cut 1 inch thick | 8 green onions, cut in 1 1/2 inch pieces |
| 2 T. cooking fat | 1/2 pound mushrooms, halved |
| Water | 1 can (8 ounces) water chestnuts, halved |
| 1/3 c. soy sauce | 2 T. cornstarch |
| 2 tsp. sugar | 1/4 c. water |
| 1/4 tsp. pepper | Cooked rice |
| 1 clove garlic, minced | |
| 3 carrots | |
| 2 green peppers, cut in 1" squares | |

Cut round steak in strips 1/8 inch thick, or thinner and 3-4 inches long. Brown strips in cooking fat in large frying-pan. Pour off drippings, measure and add water to make 1 cup liquid. Combine with soy sauce, sugar, pepper and garlic and add to meat. Cover tightly and cook slowly 45 minutes. Using vegetable parer, cut carrots lengthwise into thin strips and cut strips in half. Add carrots, peppers, onions, mushrooms and water chestnuts to meat, cover and continue cooking 15 minutes. Combine cornstarch and water and use to thicken cooking liquid. Serve with cooked rice. Yield: 6-8 servings.

*Note: When round steak is partially frozen, thin strips can be cut more easily.
